NOTICE CONVENING A PUBLIC CONFERENCE AND REQUEST FOR COMMENTS

On April 22, 2025, the Maryland Senate Budget and Taxation Committee and House Appropriation Committee issued the Joint Chairmen's Report on the Fiscal 2026 State Operating Budget (House Bill 350) and the State Capital Budget (House Bill 351) and Related Recommendations.¹ The report requires the Public Service Commission submit a report on apprenticeships within public service companies. Specifically, the committees are interested in learning about apprenticeships within utility companies.

Accordingly, the Commission initiates this Public Conference ("PC 69") for the use of collecting data for the study and to house related filings and documents. The Commission hereby requests comments from public service companies addressing the attached questions.² Public service companies are requested to provide comments by June 30, 2025, on the questions included
