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## Public Comment Hearing Set for Potomac Edison Transmission Line Rebuild

For Immediate Release: October 13, 2022

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(BALTIMORE, MD) – Local residents and other interested members of the public are invited to share their comments on the impacts of a proposal by the Potomac Edison Company to rebuild the existing Doubs-Goose Creek transmission line between Frederick and Montgomery counties. The **virtual** hearing will take place on **Thursday, October 27, 2022 at 7pm**. Chief Public Utility Law Judge Ryan C. 'Chuck' McLean will preside. The hearing will begin with a presentation by Potomac Edison on the details of the project.

Potomac Edison has applied to the Commission for what is known as a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN), which grants an applicant the authority to construct an energy generating station or high-voltage transmission line in Maryland. The Doubs-Goose Creek 500 kV transmission line begins at the Doubs Substation near Buckeystown, Maryland and runs in a southeasterly direction for 15.2 miles through Frederick and Montgomery counties to the Maryland/Virginia border. According to the application, Potomac Edison seeks to rebuild this segment of the line to address several concerns, including potential overloads, the age of existing facilities, and future growth in electricity demand.
