SOUTHERN MARYLAND ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE ANNUAL REPORT ON SUPPLIER DIVERSITY

March, 2012

For the period January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

The Cooperative's 2011 Supplier Diversity Program development priorities were focused on three objectives;

- To engage a supplier diversity management service provider to develop an online
 Tier 1 registration process for diverse suppliers, an automated process for
 verification and expiration monitoring of diverse business certifications, an
 automated process for Tier 2 Reporting (Use of Subcontractors), and the
 development of standard reports for supplier diversity reporting.
- 2. To investigate the capabilities of the supplier management service to allow non-diverse suppliers access to online registration.
- 3. To continue an outreach program to network with various organizations.

The first objective, to engage a supplier diversity management service provider, resulted in a contracted service with CVM Solutions. The project was initiated with five phases. In 2011, Phase 1 focused on the business processes to collect, store, and verify Tier 1 data from the Cooperative's Accounts Payable (AP) files. Business rules and processes were developed for the configuration of the SMECO database and the scheduled transfers of AP files. Phase 2 focused on the online registration format, web page content, and system administration of the Tier 1 portal; and HelpDesk assistance to suppliers. Phase 3 focused on the Tier 2 Reporting and involved prime contractors being provided training, assistance, and scheduled reporting by each quarter beginning in July, 2011. Tier 2 Reporting was voluntary in 2011 with approximately 55% of prime contractors participating. This involved suppliers with over \$550,000 business with the Cooperative to designate an individual to receive a 1-hour webex training course and initiate quarterly reporting. Phases 1 through 3 were completed in 2011. Phase 4 (reports testing) was delayed until 2012 and is currently underway.

An automated "soft" outreach to all active Tier 1 diverse suppliers was initiated in December, 2011. Existing diverse suppliers in the supplier management service database from AP file transfers, were sent an e-mail letter invite to register online. Suppliers that previously completed a paper registration form will be invited to register in the supplier management service via e-mail during 2012. Contact with all suppliers will continue with follow up e-mails, letters, and telephone calls to provide multiple opportunities to register.

The second objective, to investigate the capabilities of the supplier management service to allow non-diverse suppliers access to online registration, required a contract modification which was executed in 2012. Designated Phase 5, it will provide online registration for non-diverse suppliers. Upon completion, the supplier management service will provide all suppliers the opportunity for online registration, access to update their organization's information at any time, and to attach information brochures. It will provide the Cooperative capabilities not currently available:

- 1. the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes of all suppliers,
- 2. "Spend" by each non-diverse supplier,
- 3. notification of newly registered suppliers, and
- 4. capability to communicate with all registered suppliers.

The last attribute is a capability that will permit a prime contractor's representative to submit an e-mail request to the Cooperative for dissemination to the entire supplier database registry or only to suppliers in a specific NAICS code. This will increase the opportunities for registered suppliers to participate in teaming, subcontracting, or partnering arrangements with large businesses.

The third objective, to continue an outreach program to network with various organizations, is a continued effort to assess applicable networking events. Events of key regional organizations are monitored:

- Southern Maryland Minority Business Opportunities Task Force (MBOT),
- Maryland/District of Columbia Minority Supplier Development Council,
- Maryland-Washington Minority Contractors' Association, and
- The Elite Small Disabled Veteran-Owned Business (SDVOB) Network.

Several networking events were attended in 2011 and the continued involvement in MBOT is providing the greatest response from diverse suppliers. A Cooperative representative participates in MBOT meetings, activities and the Cooperative cosponsored MBOT's "SmartBiz Tool Kickoff" event on November 17, 2011. The Cooperative provided an update in its November, 2011 customer newsletter regarding its small and diverse business program and the MBOT event. The MBOT coalition continues as a prime driver of supplier diversity within the Cooperative's service area.

SUMMARY

The Cooperative contracted a supplier diversity management service and has completed 3 of 5 phases of system implementation. Phase 4 (reports testing) was delayed to 2012 and is currently underway. Phase 5 (non-diverse supplier registration) will be scheduled and completed in 2012.

The Total Utility "Spend" by non-diverse suppliers with linkage to NAICS codes is not currently available. No existing data systems contain this information and the supplier management service database retains only the diverse supplier "Spend" and NAICS codes. As previously referenced, Phase 5 will provide non-diverse suppliers online access and as AP files are transferred, non-diverse "Spend" will be available. The NAICS codes for non-diverse suppliers will be obtained as each non-diverse supplier registers online.

PRIME CONTRACTOR USE OF SUBCONTRACTORS

DIVERSE SUPPLIER SUBCONTRACTING PROGRAM

The Cooperative has developed new procedures to address procurements over \$550,000. A transition will occur in 2012 with new contracts requiring successful bidders to provide and certify Tier 2 Reporting via the supplier management service. This will start a transition from voluntary participation to a contract requirement. Technical assistance and support is currently available to Prime Contractors performing Tier 2 Reporting. The Tier 2 Audit function will also be investigated in 2012.

LIST OF COMPLAINTS

No complaints were received.

DIVERSE SUPPLIER COMPLAINT PROCESS

The Cooperative's procedures are for the Contract Administrator to investigate all complaints and report to the executive staff.

GOAL PROGRESS

The Cooperative identified \$112,713,249 as the applicable Sourceable "Spend" in the approved budget for 2011. The total of Tier 1 and Tier 2 "Spend" was 6.99% (\$7,873,638). Tier 1 and Tier 2 "Spend" were 3.76% (\$4,237,935) and 3.23% (\$3,635,703) respectively. The projected goal attainment previously reported for the 2012 Supplier Diversity Report was 15%. Only one self-certified supplier, currently seeking a federal small business certification as a woman-owned business, is included in these calculations. Future reports are projected to include a higher percentage of Tier 2 Reporting.
