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## Third Public Hearing March 26 on Cape Horn Solar Project Proposed for Carroll County

(BALTIMORE, MD) – Local residents and other interested members of the public are again invited to comment on a proposal by Elk Development, LLC to construct the 2.125 MW Cape Horn solar facility in Carroll County. The virtual hearing will take place on **Wednesday, March 26, 2025 at 7 p.m.** before Public Utility Law Judge Jennifer J. Grace.

In July 2024, Elk Development applied to the Maryland Public Service Commission for what is known as a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN), which grants an applicant the authority to construct an energy generating facility in Maryland. According to the application, the solar facility, consisting of two separate arrays and intended as part of Maryland's community solar program, would be built within 16.25 acres of a 35-acre property located at the intersection of Cape Horn Road and Hampstead Mexico Road in Hampstead. Since filing its original application, the developer has made changes to its site plan and has updated its decommissioning plan.

The hearing will include presentations by Elk Development, as well as recommendations from the Power Plant Research Program of the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, the Commission's Technical Staff and the Office of People's Counsel, followed by comments from members of the public.
